Homeless when released from prison

This leaflet is to advise people, including youth offenders, who are soon to be released from prison and may be homeless.

Definition of homeless

There are several ways that you could be considered homeless. You may be classed as homeless if:-

- You are at risk of violence or abuse where you are living. This can be from a partner, expartner or family member, or someone in your area.
- You don't have 'a roof over your head' i.e. you are street homeless
- You are at risk of losing your home
- You cannot afford to stay where you are
- Your accommodation is very temporary
- You are staying with friends or 'sofa surfing'
- You have been locked out or illegally evicted
- Your accommodation is in very poor condition
- You cannot live together with your partner or close family
- You have nowhere to put your houseboat or caravan

If you think you will be homeless after you have been released from prison, then you must inform your supervising officer within Her Majesty's Prison and Probation Service (HMPPS) as soon as possible.

Your supervising officer can assist you to seek accommodation for your release. If you do not have accommodation to go to, or if it is not appropriate for you to return to your home, then you may be offered supported accommodation such as that provided by <u>SAHA</u>.

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How the Council can help

If you have already been released from prison and you are homeless or could become homeless then you should contact Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council's via customer.services@nuneatonandbedworth.gov.uk, call 02476 376406 or drop into the Town Hall, Coton Road, Nuneaton between 9am and 5pm to arrange an appointment.

It is important that you let the Council know as soon as possible if you think you might become homeless as we can advise and support you within 56 days (or sooner) of you being threatened with homelessness.

Our Housing Solutions team can help you by:

- Assessing your housing situation and determining what your needs are
- Liaising with any support workers that are helping you after your release from prison Developing a personal housing plan so you can work towards getting a permanent home

If you are released from Prison and are under 18

If you are under 18 and have been in prison, then the <u>Warwickshire Youth Justice Service</u> will help you with finding suitable accommodation.

Up until your 18th birthday, the County Council is responsible for providing you with somewhere to live. If you are homeless and under 18, the Council might provide you with emergency accommodation while it arranges a social services assessment.

Social services must then provide accommodation while they investigate what help and support you need.

Can I Claim Benefits?

If you are a prisoner, on remand or on release, there may be benefits, grants or other financial support available to you and your family.
